OSF urologist Doctor Uwais Zaid says dementia, M-S, and an enlarged prostate can lead to holding urine. The problem can mean UTIs, bladder stones, and kidney damage.

So, how do you train yourself to pee often? Plan ahead and know when you can take breaks. Remind seniors to get up and go. And, try something called the “double void.”
